Nā Pahu 'Elima: The Five Boxes

Aloha to our family, the loyal and steadfast members of this civic club, founded by Kalaniana'ole for the good of his beloved people. It is indeed an honor and privilege lead this club, and navigate this "canoe" on our intriguing and enjoyable journey, that we might reach our collective destination victoriously.

One of my goals for our Hawaiian Civic Club of Honolulu in the coming months is to help redefine our purpose and function so that our membership will be absolutely clear as to what we're about, be proud and active members, and have a positive impact on our kulāiwi – our homeland. As we move forward, we keep our eyes fixed on the past and bring with us values and insight that our kūpuna intended for us to preserve.

The timing of Tūtū Sarah Kauka's decision to turn over HCCH archival

files in early February couldn't have been more serendipitous. Just when I thought I had a handle on who and what an why we are, I was immediately humbled and enlighted by voluminous papers, folders, memoirs, copious note, Holokū Ball programs, convention materials and more dating back generations. I was also reminded that we are indeed the "mother club," a designation I've tried to fight off in the past.

In Nov. 1918, Prince Kūhiō organized the Pu'uhonua Hui or Hawaiian Protective Association. From a luncheon meeting at the Young Hotel, the hui – endorsed by Rev. Akaiko Akana of Kawaiaha'o Church – became known as the Hawaiian Civic Club. Its purpose: to elevate the social and intellectual status of all Hawaiians. A week before this new movement was born, a headline in *The Pacific Commercial Advertiser* read as follows:

Hawaiians are not doing their part, says Kalaniana'ole. Prince tells them they are losing sight of race pride and standing idly by while haole civic organizations fight their battles (11/27/18).

All this from one small file in one of five boxes of "momi waiwai loa" – priceless gems that define who we are today. Pehea lā kākou e holomua ai? Me ka nānā pū 'ana i ka wā ma mua. How shall we move forward? By maintaining focus on our past.



With this mana o afloat, I offer a name for this column, in honor of Tūtū Kauka and the scores of Hawaiians who have laid for us an honorable foundation: Nā Pahu 'Elima.

And for our monthly newsletter in which this column will appear, I think *Pu'uhonua* is a fitting title as it suggests a protected safe haven where we as Hawaiians can be rejuvenated spiritually, culturally, socially and physically.

In each issue of *Pu'uhonua*, look for historical information gleaned from nā pahu 'elima that will help to enrich us all as we move forward, all the while, glancing back.

Waihona Kōkua Ho`ona`auao (Scholarship)

HCCH SCHOLARSHIP

The 2010 HCCH scholarship application process via website will launch on March 1. The new essay question will be included in the website on March 1. Interested applicants should access the website at: http://hcchonolulu.org/scholarship to apply. No hard copies of the application will be mailed. Eligibility includes (1) being of Hawaiian de-

scent (the submission of birth certificate showing proof of Hawaiian ancestry [first time applicants only]), (2) being a resident of Hawaii, (3) being a full-time student in an accredited two- or four-year college as either a classified undergraduate or graduate student in or out of the State of Hawaii (including foreign countries); (4) have a minimum cumulative gpa of 2.5 for undergradu-

ates and a minimum 3.0 for graduate students. Transcripts (within last six months) showing your gpa for your most current school year should be submitted no later than June 30, 2010. Priority is given to members of HCCH in good-standing including "directly-related" family members. Committee members are: Henry Gomes (Chair), Momi Clark and Blaine Fergerstrom.

- 5. Award recipients must complete 20 hours of community service per academic semester (40 hours per year).

Chaminade University: Department of Hawaiian Home Lands Opportunity Scholarship

The Department of Hawaiian Home Lands Opportunity Award is an institutional scholarship awarded to new first-year students or transfers. OHA Kāko'o Ho'ona'auao: K-12 Family Education Assistance Program

This program is sponsored by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) and is designed to provide financial assistance to economically disadvantaged Hawaiian families that have extraordinary educational expenses related to attending private elementary or secondary schools in Hawai'i or participating in programs providing educational services for students with special needs. The program is administered through the Financial Aid Office (FAO) of Chaminade University of Honolulu (CUH). For more details, visit http://www.chaminade.edu/oha/. Applicants must:

- 1. Be residents of the State of Hawai'i
- 2. Demonstrate economic disadvantage and financial need
- 3. Be a parent or primary caregiver of a child with extraordinary educational expenses
- 4. Live or be eligible to live on Hawaiian Homelands (verifiable by genealogical documentation)
- 5. Register with OHA's Hawaiian Registry Program (for information on registering call 808-594-1914)
- 6. Have a child attending a K-12 private school other than the Kamehameha Schools or participating in a special-needs academic program, in Hawai`i
- 7. Submit the required documents.
