

The Centennial Celebration held at Bishop Museum on Saturday, March 23, 2019, was - dare I say - a HUGE success! It has been way too many years since such an event as this has occurred and, as you can imagine, something like this doesn't happen by accident. In addition to the camaraderie evident amongst Hawaiians and guests, nineteen civic clubs promoted their clubs at booths located around the Great Lawn and fund-raised for their clubs; there was also 'ono mea'ai such as stew and poi, poke bowl, 'ōpelu plate, incredible entertainment such as Ku'uipo Kumukahi, and for those of you who stayed till the end - headliners Josh Tatofi and Weldon Kekau'oha.

Also represented were the Hawaiian Royal Societies, many *hālau hula* and cultural practitioners, Hawaiian-serving institutions, Hawaiian musical groups and Hawaiian schools. The crowd was estimated at 3,000. Many attendees took the opportunity to visit Bishop Museum's galleries. Surely, you didn't forget that the *'ahu'ula* and *mahiole* of

Kalaniopu'u are proudly on display in Hawaiian Hall's First Floor treasure case? If you were into sports, there was even an area next to the Science Adventure Center to participate in games such as 'ulu maika.

Let's not forget the man who started this civic pride movement - Prince Jonah Kūhiō Kalaniana'ole, whose vision is to help elevate and promote the social, economic, civic and intellectual status of Hawaiians, all while promoting the principles of good government as they themselves became outstanding citizens, leaders in their communities so that they could and would take an active part and place in the civic progress of Hawai'i and its people, not only for the Hawaiian but for the world.
